International education is not merely about studying in English or adopting a foreign curriculum, it is a comprehensive approach that prepares students to think critically, act ethically, and contribute positively in an interconnected world.

An international education emphasizes:

Global-mindedness: helping students understand and respect diverse cultures, perspectives, and challenges.

Inquiry-based learning: encouraging curiosity, problem-solving, and independent thinking.

Academic rigor: aligning with recognized international standards such as the IB framework and American education systems.

Language proficiency: providing English fluency while honoring native languages and multilingual development.

Character development: fostering leadership, empathy, resilience, and a strong moral compass.

As we consider all of these complex and demanding goals, it becomes very clear how great the responsibility and workload placed on the school are. The mission of an international school is vast, and to succeed, it requires a strong and healthy partnership with parents.

That is why I emphasize that the relationship between parents and the school must be based on trust, not doubt; on cooperation, not confrontation. It must be built on understanding, not comparison. Comparing actions and approaches between international schools and local private national schools often leads to confusion, because these are two fundamentally different educational models with different expectations, paths, and outcomes.

International education requires a distinct mindset, a commitment to process, patience, and long-term growth rather than quick results. And most importantly, it must be a choice. No family is ever obligated to follow this path. But once the decision is made, it must be a well-informed one.

So I encourage every parent to think carefully before engaging your child in an international educational system. If you are not fully prepared to understand its conditions, limits, standards, journey, and outcomes, it may not serve your family as expected.

At CISA, we are fully committed to working with every family that shares in our vision and values. We are here to guide your child, and you, on a meaningful and rewarding academic journey.

### KG1 EXPLORING ANIMAL HABITATS THROUGH ZOO ROLE-PLAY

As part of their unit **Sharing the Planet**, KG1 students explored the line of inquiry Animal Habitats through an **engaging and imaginative zoo role-play activity**. The classroom transformed into a lively zoo with domestic animals such as cows, and wild ones such as zebras. Students took on various roles—some sold tickets, others queued as visitors, while zookeepers led tours and explained how to care for the animals while respecting boundaries, learning not to touch the animals or their cages. This interactive experience helped students develop communication skills and an understanding of animal care as it supported the **SDG 15: Life on Land**, by encouraging awareness of how humans can responsibly interact with and protect animals and their natural habitats.

























# **KG3 CAREER DAY**

KG3A and B students celebrated Career Day with joy and imagination under the theme "When I Grow Up, I Want to Be..." Dressed as their future selves, the children represented a wide range of professions—from doctors, teachers, and firefighters to superheroes and astronauts. Each student had the chance to stand in front of the class and share their dream job and the reasons behind their choice. This fun and meaningful activity encouraged creativity, built confidence, and sparked curiosity about the world of work. It also helped children recognize the value of different roles in society. The event aligns with SDG 8: Decent Work and Economic Growth, by planting early seeds of inspiration about career possibilities and the importance of having goals.























































# **GRADE 1 CRAFTING THEIR OWN CLOCKS**

Grade 1A and 1B students engaged in a hands-on math and art integration activity where they crafted clocks using various 3D shapes and colorful materials. Each student created a unique and functional clock model that reflected both their creativity and understanding of geometric forms. After completing their projects, students proudly presented their clocks to the class, explaining the shapes they used and how clocks help us tell time. This activity reinforced both time-telling skills and spatial awareness while encouraging artistic expression. It ties in with **SDG 9: Industry, Innovation and Infrastructure**, as it promotes creative design thinking and a foundational understanding of how objects are structured and used in everyday life.

### **GRADE 1 MAKING CUPCAKES!**

To bring their measurement lessons to life, Grade 1A and 1B students enjoyed a hands-on learning experience by baking muffins in the school cafeteria. Guided by their teachers, the young learners measured and mixed ingredients, gaining a practical understanding of units such as grams, milliliters, and temperature. Each step of the baking process reinforced mathematical concepts in an engaging and memorable way, turning classroom theory into a real-world application. The activity also promoted collaboration, patience, and attention to detail. At the end of their hard work, the students were rewarded with the sweet treat of freshly baked muffins. This activity aligns with SDG 4: Quality Education, emphasizing creative learning for lasting understanding.











# **GRADE 1 AWARENESS ON WATER POLLUTION**

Grade 1A and 1B students took part in an eye-opening session led by guest speaker Dr. Nour, who was invited to speak about the **growing issue of water pollution**. The session aimed to raise awareness among students and encourage them to take small but meaningful actions to protect water sources. Dr. Nour explained how water pollution occurs, its harmful effects on both people and aquatic life, and the importance of clean water in our daily lives. Students listened attentively, asked questions, and reflected on how they could contribute to making a difference. This valuable learning experience connects closely with SDG 6: Clean Water and Sanitation and **SDG 14: Life Below Water**, reinforcing the importance of environmental responsibility.













### **GRADE 2 EXPLORING DAY AND NIGHT**

In an engaging and interactive class activity, **Grade 2A and 2B students explored the concept of day and night** using a globe and a torch. By simulating the rotation of the Earth with the torch acting as the Sun, students observed how light reaches only one part of the globe at a time—illustrating how day and night occur. This hands-on experience helped them visualize abstract scientific concepts in a concrete way and sparked curiosity about how Earth's movements affect our daily lives. The activity encouraged inquiry, observation, and collaborative discussion, being an essential first step in **recognizing how Earth's natural patterns influence human activity.** 










## **GRADE 2A - EXPLORING SEASONAL CYCLES**


As part of their Unit of Inquiry under the transdisciplinary theme **How the World Works**, Grade 2A students explored the central idea: The Earth's natural cycles influence how organisms live and interact. Working collaboratively in groups, they created season wheels by selecting appropriate images, labeling sections, and discussing the changes that occur throughout the year. This hands-on activity encouraged the development of communication and thinking skills, as students made meaningful connections between seasonal shifts and the ways in which living things adapt. The unit ties into **SDG 13**: **Climate Action**, highlighting awareness of environmental patterns and their impact on life.















#### **GRADE 3A - DEMONSTRATING FORCES IN REAL-LIFE SCENARIOS**


Grade 3A students took on the challenge of showcasing their understanding of forces—push, pull, gravity, friction, and magnetism—through a creative, real-life scenario project. Each learner selected a situation from everyday life, such as a car moving downhill, or a rolling backpack pushed forward. Using diagrams, illustrations, and short presentations, they explained the forces at play and how these affect the object's movement and speed. The project encouraged critical thinking as students connected classroom concepts to the world around them. By analyzing how different forces interact with objects, they developed a deeper understanding of motion and cause-effect relationships.





























# **GRADE 4 INVESTIGATING MIXTURES AND METHODS OF SEPARATION**

Under the transdisciplinary theme **How the World Works**, Grade 4A and 4B students explored the central idea: Materials change from one state to another, making them useful for different purposes. Focusing on the big idea of States of Matter, students were challenged to create a mixture or solution at home and investigate how it could be separated. In class, they presented their findings, demonstrated their mixtures, and explained the most appropriate method of separation—whether filtration, sieving, decantation, or evaporation. They also engaged in discussions about other common separation techniques and their real-world applications. This activity supports **SDG 12: Responsible Consumption and Production**, as students reflected on how material use and reuse can reduce waste and improve efficiency.


























#### **GRADE 6C PITCHING BUSINESS IDEAS!**

As part of their Design Project for **Unit 3, How Can We Be Ethical Entrepreneurs?**, Grade 6C students participated in an exciting and dynamic Pitch Day. This activity allowed learners to apply their understanding of entrepreneurship by designing and presenting original business ideas and prototypes to a panel of invited investors. Each student demonstrated not only creativity and innovation but also a strong commitment to ethical business practices. The event helped them explore concepts such as fair trade, sustainability, and social responsibility in real-world contexts. This project ties closely with SDG 8: Decent Work and Economic Growth and **SDG 12: Responsible Consumption and Production**, encouraging students to become thoughtful and ethical future leaders in the business world.
